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LESSON PLAN FOR TRICKY WORDS AND PHRASES TEACHING CARDS

Small Group use of Multiple Meaning Cards

Before

Explain what multiple meaning words are and introduce the cards.

Brainstorm with students words that have multiple meanings. For example: "ball." Have students give different meanings and write the findings on the board.

During

Read the two sentences from the card and compare the earlier responses to the definition that you brainstormed together. Discuss the illustrations on the card and have the students explain the difference in the meanings of the word as it relates to the illustrations provided.

After

Have students pair up with new cards and have them discuss their findings out loud.

EXTENSION ACTIVITIES

- Have students find multiple meaning words that are not on the cards and have them think of definitions for these words, recording them on chart paper
- Have students write new sentences for the multiple meaning words on the cards and have them draw new illustrations as well

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
